Non-Emergency Medical Transportation NEMT

- This topic came from another regions FYSPRT. Recommendations are being discussed to take to the state legislature.
- Provides access to necessary non-emergency medical services for all eligible Medicaid clients who have no other means of transportation.
- Contracted brokers serve 13 regions statewide.
- Brokers must follow WAC 182-546 through 6200. They preauthorize all transportation requests and select type of transportation that is appropriate to medical condition and capabilities.
- Individuals must have no other means of transportation available to them, be Medicaid eligible or dual coverage, have medical services covered by their benefit services package and receive services from a medical provider that is an Health Care Authority enrolled provider.
- Individuals can call their local broker to request transportation. Hospital discharges and urgent care are acceptable but no to the Emergency Department.
